About us :spectacular and sophisticated, Turda Salt Mine hides an underground world projected 13 million years ago, whose architecture was refined with rudimentary tools by the salt cutters, descended into the depths to exploit one of the most valuable resources provide by Terra. After having lured into temptation the Dacians, the Hungarian Kings and the emperors of the Habsburg Empire with its precious deposits, time has come for tourists from all corners of the world to fall in love with this land carved in salt, that overwhelms and fascinates any onlooker with its Gothic grandeur.

In 2008 the mine went into a deep process of transformation, becoming a European tourist attraction. The 6 million € that were invested into the modernization also included the amount of money necessary to build all the installations in Rudolf Mine. We are talking about two special elevators, a panoramic Ferris wheel, a playground for children, bowling, mini-golf, pool tables, tennis tables and a sports court, all located 70 m below the surface. There is also an amphitheater carved in salt, with a capacity of 180 heated seats and pull-up screen for movie projections. The incredible acoustics of the chamber makes it ideal for concerts; other events are also organized on request (conferences, presentations, shows, sport competitions).

The deepest point of the complex is the base of Theresa Mine. At the depth of 112 m below the surface there is a circular salt lake that is 8 m deep and a salt island in the middle of it. That is the place where our visitors get the unique opportunity of enjoying an underground boat ride, a potentially unforgettable experience. The most important tourist site of Turda draws almost 700.000 visitors each year and it has become a true land mark that put the name of this city on the world map once again.

All in all, a visit in Turda Salt Mine can be very special, a chance to get some good pictures, to buy a memory from the gift shop, to admire the unique architecture and the incredible views. It is a chance to understand a very important part of Transylvanian history and to have some fun in the process.
